

# Spring Turkey Hunting News From the Flocks

#### YOUTH HUNTS



Zach LaPointe (pictured to the left) got his first bird on Saturday, April 21 at 7:17 a.m. in the town of Stillwater, Saratoga County. The tom weighed 23#, had a 9.5" beard and 1+" spurs. All of this on his first ever hunt, firing a 20 gauge with an M4 style adjustable stock due to his small frame... And having a broken right trigger hand! Thank you to Chuck Law, Saratoga Strutters and Hudson Falls Fish and Game Club.

Steele Stalloch (pictured below) got his first bird during the youth hunt. The gobbler weighed 19#, 8.5" beard, 3/4" spurs. Brandon Clark guided the hunt in Edmester, NY



In the photo to the right, John got his bird on Saturday, April 21. It weighed 19#, had an 8" beard and 7/8" spurs. David Hendrick submitted the photo and information.

Matt Brownell sat out in the cold with Jacob Smith (photo below) for 4 hours during the youth hunt on Saturday before he got this guy's hens to lead him to his death. They heard gobbling all morning and had 2 jakes just out of range earlier. This Tom gobbled a couple times around 9:30 and his hens came in to check

them out.... ten minutes later, down he went! Matt said it was about the only time in life that he hooted and hollered like a little

His father, James Unser, mentored the hunt and helped to call the big bird in. Josh's turkey was taken with a 20 gauge at 30 yards. The turkey weighed 25 lbs, 8 1/4 inch beard and one inch spurs.

It was a successful morning for 13 year old Adele Clark in Honeoye, NY. Adele bagged a

19# gobbler with a 8" beard. This is Adele's first bird and her second youth hunt.

Aaron Carpenter got this triple bearded bird (shown in the photo below) in Trumansburg, Tompkins County.






#### SPRING TURKEY HUNTING NEWS FROM THE LOCAL FLOCKS (CONTINUED)



In the picture to the left is Anthony Rider. He got this bird first thing in the morning right off the roost on May 4th. The gobbler weighed 22#, had a 10" beard and spurs of 1 5/16" & 1 1/4". The take was in Voorheesville, Albany County. Anthony says "He pitched down and landed at the edge of the field and the woods. I made a 45 yard shot down hill through the woods and rolled him with my Grandpa's 11-87 NWTF turkey gun."

In the picture to the right is Anthony Rider. He got his second tom, weighing 20#, 11" beard and 1" spurs. Anthony says "This bird was gobbling his head off in the hay field. I quickly set up on him in the open hardwoods. I called to him and he gobbled and strutted all the way in."









On May 3rd, in Oppenheim, Fulton County, Devin Gee took his 75 year old grandfather, Pete O'Dell, for his first turkey hunt (in the above photo). Grandpa watched over Devin's shoulder as Devin shot this 22#, 9" bearded gobbler. Grandpa is now hooked! This is the first of many more hunts together! #hookedat75

Devin Gee (who is pictured above) tagged out on May 9th with this 23# gobbler with a 9 3/4" beard and 1 1/8" spurs. Devin states that he roosted him the night before, almost a mile away. In the morning, the hens pitched above him at about 45 yards, the gobbler was below him at 75 yards and strutted right to the gun barrel. Taken in Oppenheim, Fulton County.



Shown in the photo above is John Arneth with the 22# gobbler he bagged on opening day.

In the photo to the right is Mickey O'Kane who says "Here's my opening day gobbler from Onondaga County, New York. The two year old bird weighed 21 pounds 11 ounces, 7" beard and 3/4" spurs. I used 3" Hevi-Shot #7 for the 36 yard shot."




# Women the Outdoors

Prior to the implementation of Women in the Outdoors, NWTF supported female-focused outdoor skills training programs through various organizations. Seeing the demand for such activities for women, the NWTF expanded its outreach efforts to include a formal Women in the Outdoors program in 1998.

In the past decade, the number of women owning firearms and participating in target shooting and hunting has soared. See the "Girl Power" graphic to the right, provided with permission from the National Shooting Sports Foundation published in their 2014 Women Gun Owners: Purchasing, Perceptions and Participation article.

According to Southwick Associates, women now make up more than a quarter of all anglers and represent the fastest growing segment within the hunting and shooting communities.

Women who seek outdoor adventures or more quality time with family and friends will find that connection through hundreds of Women in the Outdoors events hosted by NWTF chapters around the United States. Events are affordable and offer outdoor activities such as archery, shotgunning and various introduction to hunting classes. Women in the Outdoor members receive a one year subscription to Turkey Country magazine and special discounts. Get your membership today.







#### **NWTF Scholarship 2018**

The time is here for your chapter to select a worthy candidate for the Dr. James Earl Kennamer scholarship. There has been a slight change in position of the national for criteria of qualification. for 2018, "Applicants do NOT need to be pursuing a wildlife or conservation-related degree in college to be eligible". Any high school senior is welcome to apply so long as they provide the required material.

To complete the time line for a candidate to make state or national recognition the applications must be back to chapter Presidents by January 1st and submitted to the state committee chairman or President by February 1st. The state will forward the winner to National by March 1st.

Any other chapter applications can be submitted up until July 1st to receive \$250 in Super Fund monies for a local scholarship.

# WHEELIN' SPORTSMEN

Wheelin' Sportsmen began at the NWTF in October 2000. The NWTF recognized the need to help people with disabilities enjoy the outdoors by participating in hunting and shooting sports.

NWTF hunting events provide participants an opportunity they may not be able to have on their own. Either due to the lack of hunting land access, lack of the knowledge of how to go about returning to the field after an injury, or lack of needed assistance. Oftentimes, the knowledge and experience gained at one of our events allows the participants to continue hunting on their own throughout the year.

#### NWTF-NY PARTNERS TO IMPROVE HABITAT WITHIN ALLEGANY MOUNTAINS FOCAL LANDSCAPE By: Doug Little and Randy Opferbeck

The New York State Chapter of the National Wild Turkey Federation (NWTF-NY), partnered with the NY State Department of Environmental Conservation Division of Lands and Forests (NYS DEC) to enhance 15.5 acres of habitat on the North Nine Mile State Forest. This property is open for hunting and is located in the town of Allegany in Cattaraugus County,

The work consisted of felling undesirable trees that were shading and otherwise competing with apple trees for resources. The desired conditions include quality wild turkey nesting and brood rearing habitat, while also increasing the viability and productivity of the apple trees within the 2 stands that were treated. We anticipate increased herbaceous cover at the ground level as a result of the forest canopy being opened, resulting in greater insect abundance for foraging wild turkey poults. Additionally, the felled trees remaining on site will provide adequate ground cover for hens to nest.

These 2 stands are adjacent to a large field that will also serve as brood habitat for hens successful in their nesting attempts. Bear, deer, grouse, woodcock and many other wildlife species will also benefit from this work.

NWTF has made a concerted effort to provide resources and improve habitat conditions in southwestern NY State. As you may recall from prior newsletter articles, Kristen Schnepp-Giger, NWTF wildlife biologist, is providing technical assistance to private landowners in several western NY State counties. NWTF-NY also assisted with NYS DECs efforts to enhance habitat on Hanging Bog WMA in partnership with Ruffed Grouse Society. Although it was a small 3 acre project, the resulting young forest habitat will provide much needed quality nesting cover in an area of predominantly mature woods.

ENHANCING HABITAT ON NWTF MEMBER'S LAND REGIONAL CONSERVATION PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM (RCPP) BY: KRISTEN SCHNEPP-GIGER, NWTF WILDLIFE BIOLOGIST

Chances are pretty good that you're familiar with NWTF's Save the Habitat. Save the Hunt. initiative. New York continues to work through its member base and with partner agencies to deliver mission centric habitat work across the Empire State.

A unique opportunity exists here where NWTF (and other like-minded NGO) biologists are working with Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) on the Regional Conservation Partnership Program (RCPP). This program enables biologists to meet with landowners free of charge to discuss and plan implementation of young forest habitat on private lands across the state. This work has been going on for well over a year and results are coming in! NWTF members are benefitting from this program in big ways. The pictures (on page 16) show the initial results of a timber cutting one member recently completed on his land around one of his food plots. Creating young forest habitat around an established food plot provides excellent browse for deer (alleviating some of the pressure from your food plot) as well as escape cover for fawns, turkey poults, and a variety of other critters.

Many of the logs will be removed and put to good use. The landowner plans to make boards out of some of them for use in his wood shop. He also plans to cut firewood out of the downed timber. Several logs will remain on the ground and provide excellent drumming logs for grouse which will likely be attracted to the regenerating area. Tree tops will remain scattered on the ground to protect some seedling trees from deer browse. The landowner completed all of this work AND will be receiving cost-share money from NRCS for a job well done.

This is a great example of how landowner goals/ objectives are rolled into the planning process for these contracts. It creates a win-win where the landowner is more than happy to complete the work, we're getting acreage for our Save the Habitat. Save the Hunt. state goals, and the federal agency (NRCS) is realizing more contracts coming to fruition because of partner biologists than they could handle completing themselves. When like-minded conservation focused individuals get together, wildlife wins every time!
