

NWTF-NY State Annual Update

In September 2012 the NWTF embarked on our Save the Habitat. Save the Hunt. initiative. This is a 10-year initiative to conserve or enhance 4 million acres of critical upland habitat, create 1.5 million hunters and open access to 500,000 additional acres for hunting. The progress that has been made towards these critical goals has been nothing short of extraordinary.

I would like to thank you, our membership in NY, for your efforts and contributions that have helped make our conservation impact on the ground happen. Not only directly through your use of our seed programs available to members of NWTF in NY State, but also for your support at our local chapter fundraising events across the state. Your contributions have allowed us to leverage funding for a variety of grants and agreements that result in significant positive impacts for the wild turkey resource and our hunting heritage.

Our NWTF-NY Goals:

Conserve or enhance 6,000 acres of private land habitat annually, Conserve or Enhance 5,000 acres of public land habitat in the next 5 years; Conserve or enhance 500 acres of corporate/industrial habitat in the next 5 years.

Within NY State a premium is placed on projects that will improve wild turkey nesting/young forest cover, brood rearing habitat, and winter foraging habitat.

These goals are put in place to help increase our state's wild turkey population back up to the 225,000 level.

Since 2013, approximately 24,835 acres have been conserved/enhanced in NY State through 2018.

Acres specific to conservation objectives include: Public Land: 5,138 acres enhanced since 2013 (see map) Private Land: 19,697 acres of public land enhanced since 2013

Wild Turkey Specific Benefits include: Brood & Nesting/ Young Forest Habitat = 6,621.5 Acres Winter foraging habitat = 18,213.5 Acres

Access: 67 Acres added to Northern Montezuma WMA



NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Shanna Shaw and Elizabeth Marks, of the New York Natural Resource Conservation Service office, accepted conservation




awards during the 43rd annual National Wild Turkey Federation Convention and Sport Show. Mossy Oak is the official show sponsor.

The Making Tracks with the NRCS award recognizes people or projects that best incorporate conservation education, partnerships and wild turkey management to support the NWTF's Save the Habitat. Save the Hunt. initiative.

Wildlife biologists by trade, both Shaw and Marks have been instrumental in building the partnership between New York NRCS and the NWTF. Because of their efforts, NRCS has worked with the NWTF and private forest landowners through the Regional Conservation Partnership Program to provide technical and financial assistance to improve forest wildlife habitat.

Much of the conservation efforts are in the NWTF's Allegany focal landscape, a region defined in the NWTF's Save the Habitat. Save the Hunt. initiative as an area of critical need. One of the area's biggest limiting factors for turkey population growth is the lack of suitable nesting habitat. However, Shaw and Marks have worked alongside NWTF staff to encourage landowners to actively manage their forests to provide this critical early habitat needed by turkeys and other associated wildlife species.

"We could not do what we do without partners like the NRCS," NWTF CEO Becky Humphries said. "Their dedicated staff make building the necessary partnerships a much easier task."
