

On February 12-14, 2016, Samuel and Connor Warren, of Almond, New York attended the National Wild Turkey Federation 2016 Convention and Sport Show in Nashville,



Tennessee. The multiday convention and sport show included turkey and owl calling contests, turkey call contests, seminars, and exhibits covering all aspects of hunting. Sam and Connor competed in turkey calling contests in their respective divisions. Sam placed 8th in the Junior Division (age 11-15) and Connor placed 3rd in the Poult Division (under 10). Prior to competing at Nationals,

each competitor had to place 1st in their respective state's certified turkey calling contest. Sam and Connor competed with self-made box calls and calls made by their grandfather, Mike Warren. Connor also used a Jesabelle slate call made by students in the Multi-Occupations program at Wildwood Education Center in Hornell.

PRESIDENT BILL WILBUR RECEIVES THE ROGER LATHAM AWARD

Bill Wilbur of Mexico, New York, is dedicated to recruiting the next generation of outdoorsmen and women. His contributions earned him a national award from the National Wild Turkey Federation.

Wilbur received one of five Roger M. Latham Sportsman Wild Turkey Service Awards at the 40th annual NWTF Convention and Sport Show. RAM is the official convention sponsor. Roger M. Latham Sportsman Wild Turkey Service Awards are given to NWTF members who are not employed as professional wildlife managers, but have made significant contributions to wild turkey conservation.

"I am honored to receive a Latham award," Wilbur said.

"I am a turkey hunting addict, and that is how I was introduced to the NWTF. The more involved I became with the organization, the more I learned about what they did and the more I wanted to help."

The NWTF determined this year's award winners based on how their work strengthens the Save the Habitat. Save the Hunt.



initiative. Wilbur, a 20-year NWTF member, has worked tirelessly to introduce hunting, fishing and an outdoor way of life to new audiences.

Since planning and hosting New York's first NWTF Wheelin' Sportsmen event – a turkey hunt for those who have disabilities - he has expanded Wheelin' Sportsmen opportunities to include multiple fishing, turkey hunting, snow goose hunting and deer hunting events. Wilbur also is very involved in working with disabled veterans through Operation Injured Soldier and the Warrior Transition Unit at Fort Drum.

Wilbur takes time each fall to mentor first-time hunters during the Cortland Limbhangers' NWTF Women in the Outdoors fall turkey hunt. He also was the Oswego River Chapter's JAKES (Juniors Acquiring Knowledge, Ethics and Sportsmanship) coordinator for 17 years and the Wheelin' Sportsmen coordinator for 12 years.

"Bill has made a tremendous impact in his community and state," said George Thornton, NWTF CEO. "He exemplifies the NWTF's mission of conservation and the preservation of our hunting heritage."

Wilbur has been a committee member of the Oswego River Chapter since 1997, is president and founding member of the Salmon River Strutters and also serves on the banquet committee for the Cortland Limbhangers.



MAKING A HABITAT DIFFERENCE LOCALLY

Over the last few years you may have noticed a concerted effort to promote the benefits and importance of young forest habitat. With the number of wildlife species dependent on this cover type, federal and state natural resource agencies and non-governmental organizations are investing a great deal of resources towards this habitat type. The National Wild Turkey Federation is among them.

The NWTF has invested significant time and energy into establishing partnerships and agreements with a focus on creating and maintaining young forest habitats. These partnerships have ranged from multi-state agreements with US Department of Agriculture Natural Resources Conservation Service to agreements that target our efforts in a few southeastern NY counties.

In all cases, these agreements provide an opportunity to address critical nesting and brood rearing habitat for wild turkeys. Both habitats are key priorities within NY's plan for our Save the Habitat. Save the Hunt, initiative.

While traditional thinking may not consider wild turkeys a species of young forests, their dependence on them is no less important. Consider the nesting cycle of an adult hen turkey. Hens may begin to lay eggs in early April and, on average, lay 12 eggs prior to the beginning of incubation. One egg per day is deposited into the nest and covered with surrounding vegetation until the clutch is completed. Once incubation is initiated, hens are on the nest for 28 days.

The amount of thick vegetation available in early spring is particularly limiting because most vegetation is still dormant or in the infancy stages of green-up. You may walk through your woods in late spring or summer and think there are plenty of areas for a hen to hide. Vegetation is tall, leafy, and readily capable of concealing a turkey nest. Take that walk in late winter/early spring and those areas are barren and devoid leafy concealment. Without brushy habitat or young forest, early spring nesting opportunities that conceal a hen and nest from predators are minimal.

Our changing landscape is resulting in more mature forest land, particularly throughout NY and the other northeastern states. As forests mature, the canopy limits the amount of sunlight reaching the ground level. Coupled with browsing pressure from abundant deer in many areas, these factors have resulted in loss of thick understory vegetation. Find a spot in the forest where a large canopy tree either blew down or was otherwise harvested. You will likely see a vegetation response in that small area where sunlight has been able to reach the forest floor. Even that vegetation will likely be impacted by deer browse. Though you will see the response to some degree.

Establishing brushy, young forest cover on a broader scale within your property will benefit numerous species. Young forest habitat can greatly improve your deer hunting observations while providing nesting cover for turkey, grouse, and woodcock. If you are a bird dog owner, you can certainly put your dog in a better mood by creating this type of cover, which will typically attract woodcock and grouse.

In many cases, establishing as little as a 5-10 acre patch of thick cover is just what the doctor ordered. For example, if you hunt a property that contains mature woods and open fields you may have limited observations of deer. Adding a 5-10 acre patch for thick, young forest cover to that property, the kind you do not look forward to walking through, and there is a good chance you will be

attracting deer and other game looking for a hideout during the fall season. Even better, consider that recently created cover a sanctuary of sorts, meaning that you are not allowed to walk through it for deer drives, stalking deer, etc. and it may increase utilization of the area even more. Hunting stands situated between that cover and a food source when the wind is right and your efforts to create that cover could pay dividends in short order.

Ideally, young forest habitat should be created in 5-10 acres patches or more. However, if you are conducting smaller scale timber harvests on your property there are some steps you can take to enhance your young forest creation. For instance, select tree harvests, if spread out over several acres may be tailored to provide nesting opportunities for wild turkeys and other ground nesting birds. By leaving treetops scattered through the area, the timber harvests provided excellent nesting opportunities in very close proximity to great brood habitat. I was involved in a wild turkey study in Michaux State Forest in south-central PA back in the early 2000's and had a number of hens with radio transmitters successfully nest in treetops left after timber harvest operations.

This brings me to another way you can help. Please support efforts of our state and federal agency partners when they are planning to actively manage our public lands. Your support of their plans to manage forest resources could be the difference in their ability to proceed with projects planned to enhance forest land for a wide variety of species. You can support agency efforts as a resident, via writing or public comment, for active forest management with NY State DEC Unit Management Plans when they are up for review. NY residents can also support agency efforts for Young Forest Initiative work on Wildlife Management Areas, US Forest Service management activities on Finger Lakes National Forest, and other like-minded endeavors impacting active forest management.

Consider how young forest habitat may fit into your goals as a landowner. Managing for this cover type does take significant effort, but there are opportunities to apply for technical and financial assistance. USDA-NRCS, for example, could be a source of financial support for establishing this priority cover type. Though the programs offered may be geared towards a particular species such as New England cottontail, American woodcock, golden-winged warblers, etc., the habitat created benefits numerous species, including wild turkeys. Search for USDA-NRCS in NY on the web to learn more about available conservation programs or go to http://www.nrcs.usda.gov/wps/portal/nrcs/site/ny/home/ to locate your local county office and inquire about programs available in person.

For a limited time, I may be available to visit landowners in Columbia, Rensselaer, Dutchess, Putnam, and Westchester counties to determine if young forest cover may be a good fit and to help navigate conservation programs available that could help cover some or all of the costs associated with the habitat work.

Conservation depends on hunters, it depends on you. Can you give us one? Can you create just one new membership? Can you gift a membership to a friend, family member, or co-worker? Invite them to a local banquet to see just how great this organization is and welcome them into our family. Take a new person hunting this year. Show someone who wouldn't normally hunt the great opportunities that await them right out their back door.

The goals of the "Save the Habitat, Save the Hunt" initiative are to conserve or enhance 4 million acres of critical upland habitat, create 1.5 million new hunters, and to open access to 500,000 additional acres for hunting. I am happy to announce that in the past 2 years we have already come close to 1/3 of our goal for new hunters created through NWTF programs.

One important aspect of counting these "hunters created" is gathering all of the information. If a NYS Certified Hunter/ Trapping Safety Instructor is a NWTF member, we can count the people that graduate from the class with their certificate. There's more to the counting side of this but it would be a huge help to find out which instructors are NWTF members. If you know of any instructors that are members or are willing to be members, please put them in contact with us. You can reach us through the NWTF website or email at NWTF_HunterEd@yahoo.com.

Stay tuned for more exciting news regarding some first time events in New York that we will be using to recruit new hunters. Some of the ideas are wild game-wine pairing dinners, how to prepare wild game classes, learn to hunt classes, and a mentored hunting program.

The ending of the new NWTF video "Rise and Fly" has a quote also which says:

"A fire starts as a flame, lit by a spark...be that spark!"



Significant federal cost-share funds are available for landowners interested in creating and/or maintaining young forest habitat on their lands in selected parts of these counties: Rensselaer, Columbia, Dutchess, Putnam, Westchester. If you are interested in creating five or more acres of young forest habitat, we want to hear from you.

Young forest management creates excellent woodcock, grouse, New England cottontail, deer and turkey habitat a host of other wildlife and plants as well. This is a great opportunity for landowners to create habitat that will attract more game, improve hunting success, and increase overall wildlife diversity.




COHOCTON VALLEY CHAPTER



The Southern Tier chapter plans to sponsor a youth hunt again this year. The dates will be April 23rd and 24th.



Dear New York Member:

The New York State Chapter Board of Directors is pleased to offer its members the opportunity to purchase seed and seedlings at a subsidized price. Annual members may select only two of the subsidized options on the offer form. Sponsor members and Upper level members may select three items from the form. The New York State Hunting Heritage Super Fund will pay for 50 percent of the seed, seedlings, and shipping charges.

All orders are filled on a first-come, first-served basis. Quantities are limited on subsidized seed and seedlings due to the dollars allocated to the program. For shipping allow 2 to 3 weeks from the date your order is entered in our system. Additional bags of seed or seedlings may be purchased in **unlimited** quantities using the non subsidized portion of the order form.

Buckwheat is a very popular feed crop for wildlife, as well as an excellent cover crop. It does well in almost any soil and produces heavy seed crop that shatter easily making them readily accessible to turkeys, ducks and other wildlife. Plant after the danger of frost has passed and at the rate of 40-50 lbs. per acre. A weed-free, smooth, well-prepared seedbed should be established before the crop is seeded. Seed should be placed into moist soil to ensure quick germination (can mature in 10 to 12 weeks with good weather). Do not seed more than 2 inches deep. Fertilize with 5-10-10.

Triple Threat Clover Mix is a concentrated, pre-inoculated clover mix including Crimson, Patriot, and Durana clovers. All seeds in this mix are legumes, which means that you will be providing the best quality food and cover conditions for wild turkeys, deer and other wildlife on your property. This mix of seed is adapted to most sites and will stay established for several years with proper maintenance. Prepare the seedbed by disking or harrowing the ground. Create a smooth seedbed. Always do a soil test! Add the recommended amounts of lime and fertilizer. Incorporate both into the soil. Broadcast seed over one acre. Cover seed 1/4" deep using a drag or cultipacker to ensure good seed to soil contact. Soil pH should be 6.0 to 7.0. Normally can be planted early fall or early spring depending on location. Check with local Extension Office for proper seeding dates.

Clearfield Sunflower theses sunflowers were developed with a resistance to herbicides using the active ingredient imazamox. They have become a favorite choice with people who plant and manage sunflower fields because of the advantage of being able to control weeds in the field more easily. Staggered plantings allow different maturity dates and may benefit management of fields.

Red Splendor Crabapple

An upright, more or less open headed tree, flowers are a rosy red bloom. Outstanding features are the tree's almost complete disease resistance and its small red fruit, 1 cm in diameter that cling to the trees all winter. The flowering crabapples are durable, provide a valuable food source for wildlife and are strikingly beautiful in bloom. Crabapples remain on the tree all through winter, providing a good food source for turkeys, grouse and songbirds well into spring.

Each purchase results in the establishment of quality wild turkey brood habitat. Your efforts support the NY State Chapter efforts to Save the Habitat. Save the Hunt. Your membership and financial support at NWTF Hunting Heritage Banquets helps make this program possible and allows the NWTF to address high priority habitat needs in your state. THANK YOU!
